Bibliographical References Footnotes

Your volume will use the 'short title' system of references.

In this system, bibliographical references appear in the footnotes — on the first occasion in full, thereafter in a shortened form:

For books, give both the place of publication and (where known) the publisher.

There is a space after 'p.' or 'pp.'. (Note that 'p.' or 'pp.' are omitted from journal references.)

Manuscript pressmarks should follow the usage of the library concerned.

Examples are: British Library, Additional MS 2787.

British Library, Lansdowne MS civ.

Public Record Office, State Papers, Foreign Series, Elizabeth, Holland, xxxvi.

Note that footnote indicators in the text appear after any punctuation:
